Course Description

Welcome to Introduction to Psychology. In this course we will explore the complex worlds of mind and behavior. The primary focus of this course will be on your learning about, and thinking critically about what psychologists know about people. In the science of psychology the unknown greatly exceeds the known. Thus, you will also learn that there remains much work to do when it comes to understanding and explaining how and why we do what we do. Finally, much of what makes psychology interesting is that it is relevant to our personal lives. Psychology has everything to do with what it means to be a human being. As we progress through the course, I will do my best to help students make these connections if they're not immediately apparent.

Special notes: It is very important that students understand that a) **this is not a "self-paced" course where students work in isolation without due dates for work (time zone is Eastern Standard Time)**. To be successful, students will need to interact with the group and complete assignments as scheduled; b) **if a student adds this course after it has begun and has missed work, all of the missed/late work policies below apply. Since this is an intensive course, persons who choose to add late and start late should not expect to be treated differently than those who were able to begin the course on time.**

Course Policies

Computer Problems and Saving Work: Computers are known to break down and do other unpredictable things. You are responsible to take all precautions and have contingency plans in place, just in case. Computer problems are NOT valid excuses for missed or late work. It is recommended that you, when appropriate, create and save back up files to an electronic storage device for written work you complete for this class. Saving duplicate copies of your work to an external device will ensure that a computer glitch or a glitch in cyberspace won't erase your efforts.

Feedback Wanted: I am interested in your feedback on how I can make this course better. At any time during the course, students are encouraged to send me a private message with suggestions on how I can make this a better course. Please don't wait until evaluation time because I won't see those comments until the term is over.

Extended Sickness and Personal Circumstances: Success in this highly-condensed course requires regular and consistent participation. Again, this is not a "self-paced" course. Rather, there is a "set" schedule with work due every day at specific times that may or may not perfectly fit your schedule. If you find yourself in a situation in which this is a problem (e.g., you are working at times that conflict with the course, or on vacation in a place with limited Internet access) you should contact me as soon as possible (ideally prior to starting) to discuss your ability to complete the course. **The basic structure and requirements of the course cannot be**

changed to fit individual students' particular circumstances. Whatever flexibility is possible (and there always is some) is **already built in to the course.** If necessary, you will be encouraged to meet with your advisor to discuss your options, which may include withdrawing from the course and retaking it when your circumstances have improved.

Missed/Late Work: There will be no makeups, do-overs (and so forth), for missing or late work of any kind. Rather, I will **drop your lowest module quiz score** (the grade for the final examination cannot be dropped). Scores on written work submitted late will be adjusted per the rubric for the particular assignment. **I will not accept written work submitted more than two days after the posted due date.** Posts submitted late to the Discussion Board (DB) will also impact your grade, per the scoring rubric for the DB. Once a DB is closed, it will not be reopened for posting. **I will drop your lowest module DB score.**

Course Activities and Requirements

Learners will demonstrate their learning through the following activities and assignments.

Pretests, Quizzes, and Final Exam

Ungraded Pretests: A 20-item ungraded “pretest” will accompany each module. Pretests will contain questions that pertain to module learning objectives and will be a good index of the type of questions you can expect to see in the graded quizzes. You can take pretests as many times as you want. You can also stop and resume any pretest at a later time. **Pretest scores do show up in "Grades" but do not count toward your final grade.**

Online Quizzes: You will be responsible for completing thirteen, 20-question multiple-choice graded quizzes, which will count for 20% of your grade for the course. Quizzes for all modules will open at 12:30 AM on the start day for each module and they will close at 11:59 PM on the dates provided in the course schedule below. You must complete quizzes on or before their due dates. **Once quizzes are closed they will not be reopened.** Quizzes will be timed (30 minutes, 1.5 minutes per item pace, which is the "industry standard") and will be based on the learning objectives provided for each module. As noted in some modules, "red font" objectives will not be discussed in the lecture video for that module. This means you will need to locate information pertaining to these objectives in the assigned reading. Correct and incorrect answers will be viewable after all have completed the quiz.

Online Final Exam: On the last day of the course (see course schedule for exact date) there will be an 80-question, multiple-choice **comprehensive** final examination that will be worth **20%** of your final grade. The exam will be accessible from the "Final Exam/Course Wrap Up" module that will become available on that date. It will open at 12:30 AM and close at 11:59 PM, so you'll need to take it within this time frame. It will be timed (120 minutes, 1.5 minutes per item) and will be based on the learning objectives I've provided for each module. It will be composed of a random mix of questions from each module. The best way to study for the final will be to take the pretests, review past quizzes, study the text and other materials (e.g., notes, answers to learning objectives) you've used to prepare for prior quizzes. It is your responsibility to sort out your technology prior to beginning the final. Please be sure you have reliable computer and connection.

Very important notes on taking online quizzes/exam:

- Quizzes/exam auto-score. You can review quizzes/exam after submitting them. Correct and incorrect answers will be viewable after all have completed the quiz. To review your quiz/exam later, **click on your quiz in "Grades."** Should you want more detailed feedback, please contact me.
- For an online quiz/exam to be completed successfully, you must do your part. This means sorting out any technical issues prior to attempting any quiz and following instructions. Be sure to view the “Taking Online Quizzes and Tests” tutorial (under “Tutorials” menu item). If you do not adhere to these guidelines you will almost certainly run into trouble.
- If you run into a problem while taking a quiz or exam, 1) send me a message, 2) tell me your situation, and 3) I **may** reset the quiz/exam, depending on the circumstances. **I very likely will not reset if you have not done your part to ensure success (i.e., making sure your technology is in good order and that you had a good Internet connection prior to launching the quiz or exam.** Keep in mind that I may not be able to get back to you right away (I need a 24-hour window for communications). **Also, when a quiz/exam is reset, you will receive a different test** since questions are generated randomly from a large pool of items. This means you will not be able to start where you left off on the first attempt.
- Students will be allowed a maximum of two resets for this course: **one for quizzes and one the final exam.**
- If you re-attempt a quiz/exam, it's the score on the **second attempt that will count** (not the higher of the two attempts).
- To avoid issues, please follow best practices and sort out issues in advance re-taking online quizzes/exam!
- **Please (please) do not expect or request any exceptions or any special treatment. Since this is an online course, the expectation is that your technology will be in good order, including your Internet connection.**

Other very important things to consider:

- Prior to taking any quiz or the final exam, please review "Taking Online Quizzes and Tests," tutorial which is a tutorial I created. It is located in the "Getting Started" module.
- You are expected to work independently on quizzes/exam.
- While they are still open, please do not discuss quizzes or the final exam.
- All quizzes and the final exam are open book, open notes.
- Quizzes and the final exam must be completed the first time you access or open the test by clicking on the link.
- You cannot save questions and close out and return to quizzes/exam, so set aside time needed to complete them in one instance.

- Clicking on other pages while you have the quiz/exam open will result in an incomplete, therefore do not click around while you have the test open.
- Your answers will save as you move through the quiz/exam. Submit the quiz/exam when you have responded to all the questions.
- You will have access to the quizzes from 12:30 AM the day a module opens until the specified close dates (in course schedule below). The quizzes will not be available to take after their close dates.
- In some cases, a graded quiz/exam may be reset by me. If so, the score for the second ("latest") attempt will be the one that counts. This is primarily to support students who experience technical or other issues during a first attempt. Since quiz/exam questions will be generated at random from a large pool of test items, the second quiz/exam will not be the same as the first. No more than two resets **for this course** are possible (one for a quiz, one for final exam. Please be sure your technology is in good order as there will be no exceptions.
- Missed quizzes/exam cannot be made up. However, I will drop your lowest module quiz score.

Quiz/Exam Rubric: Each of the 20 questions in quizzes will be worth one point. Thus, each quiz is worth 20 points. The final will contain 80 questions worth a total of 80 points. You will be able to see your score under the "Grades" menu item.

Written Work

Critical Thinking Exercises: Students will select and complete two **Critical Thinking Exercises** of their choosing that will be worth **15% (7.5% per assignment)** of their final grade. Please refer to the **Critical Thinking Exercises tutorial** found in the "Getting Started" module for specific assignment details.

Watch and Respond: Students will complete two **Watch and Respond** writing assignments that will be worth **20% (10% per assignment)** of their final grade. Please refer to the **Watch and Respond Activities tutorial** found in the "Getting Started" module for specific assignment details.

Discussion Board Participation (DB)

DB Participation: Active participation is crucial to the successful completion of an online course. Active participation is evidenced by involvement in each module's discussion board sessions, providing thoughtful posts, feedback to your peers, responding to questions I post directed at you or the group, and posting to the discussion board on time. You will receive a score for each DB. However, I will not provide an evaluation of DB participation at the close of each module. This would amount to micromanagement, which can squash the life out of the DB and is not my style. Rather, evaluative feedback and a grade for completed modules will be provided on the day following the close of modules 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, and 13. This will be sufficient timing of feedback for most who want to seek advice from me and to take corrective action, if needed. This will be worth 25% of your overall grade for the course. ***Please do not post questions you have about course content or the course in general, quizzes, etc., to the discussion board. Rather, ask me questions using "inbox."*** Please refer to the **Discussion Board Participation tutorial** for specific assignment details.
